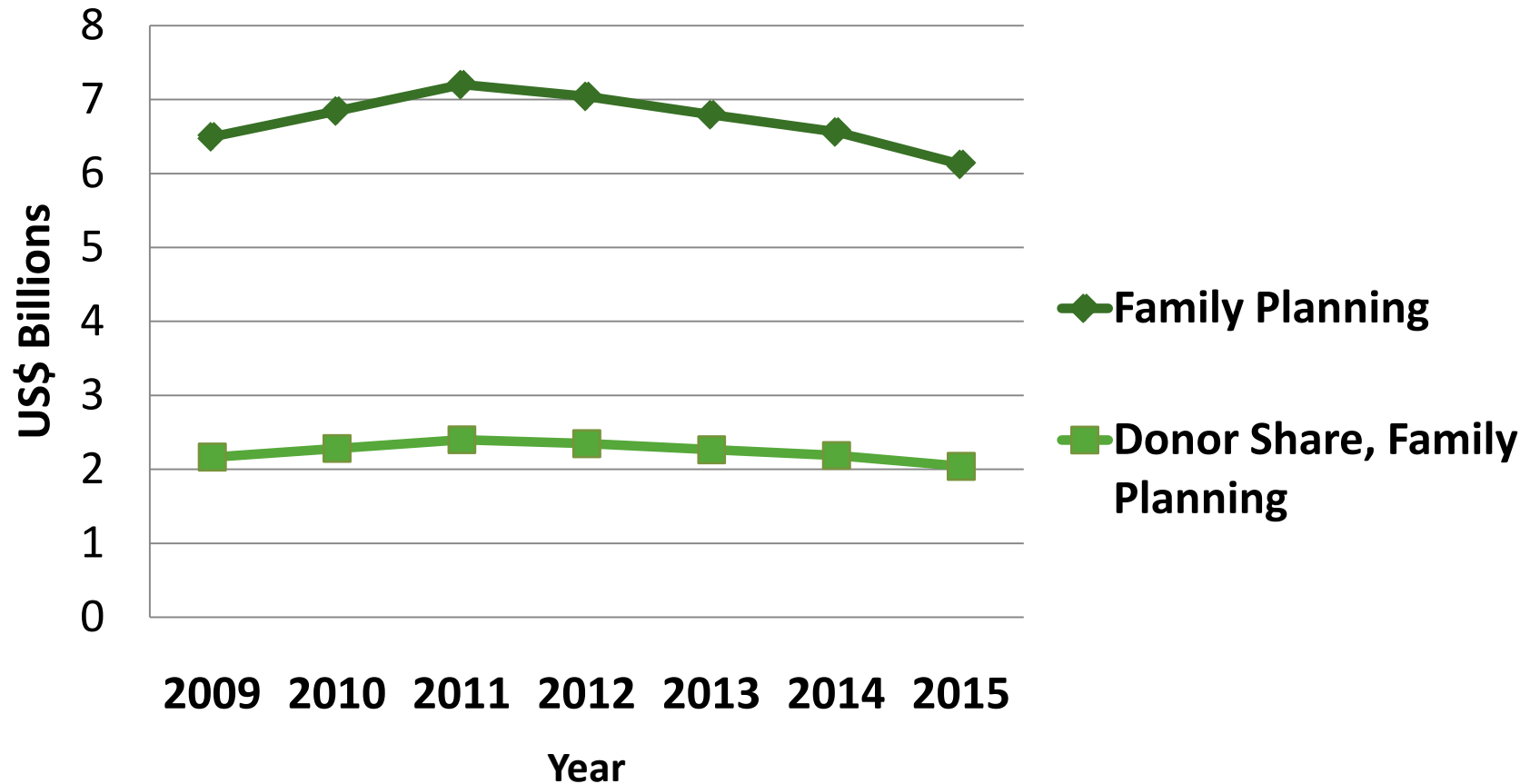
Funding Essential to Family Planning

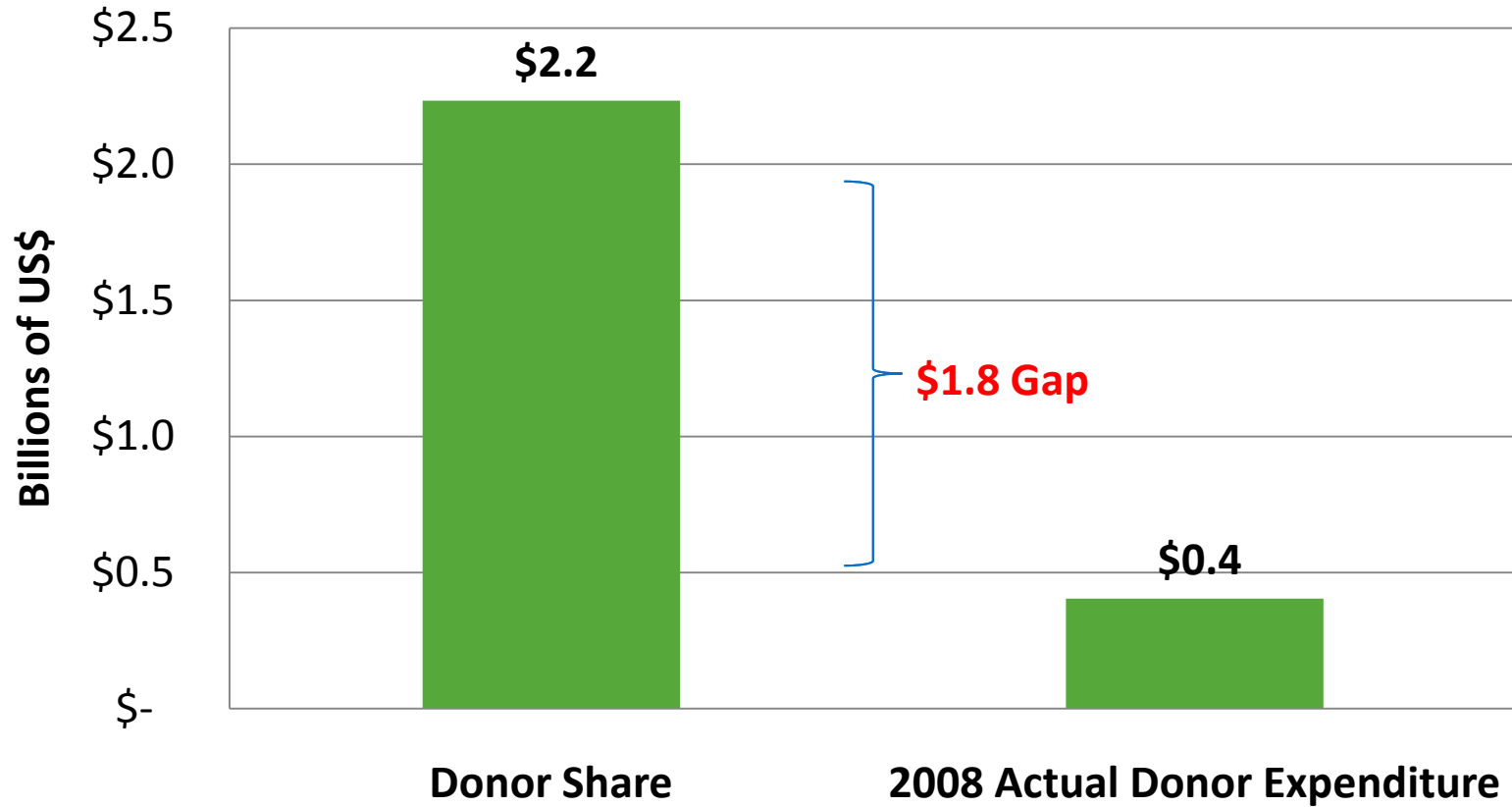

Funding Needed for International Family Planning, 2009-2015



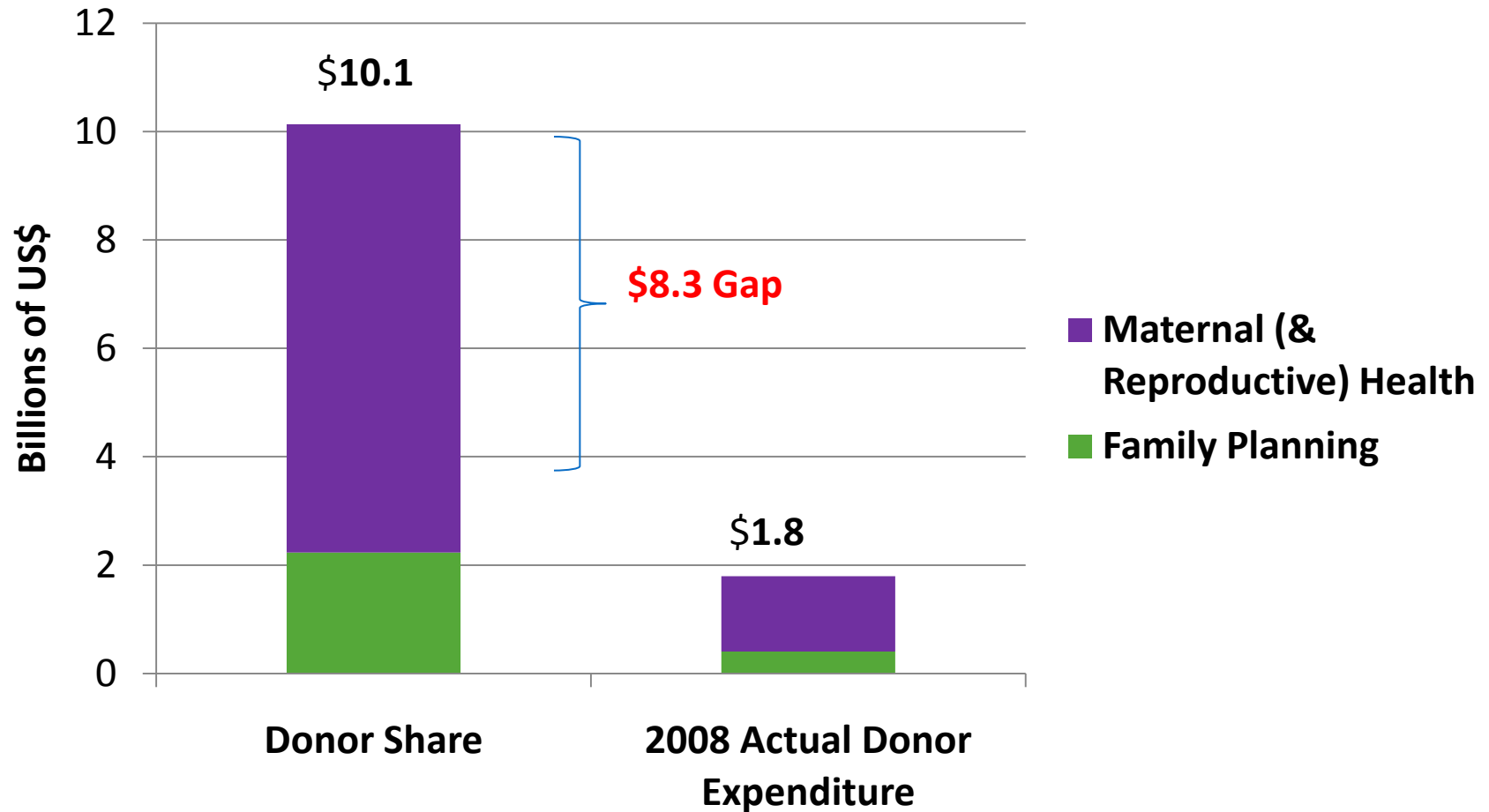

Donor Funding Gap for Sexual and Reproductive Health



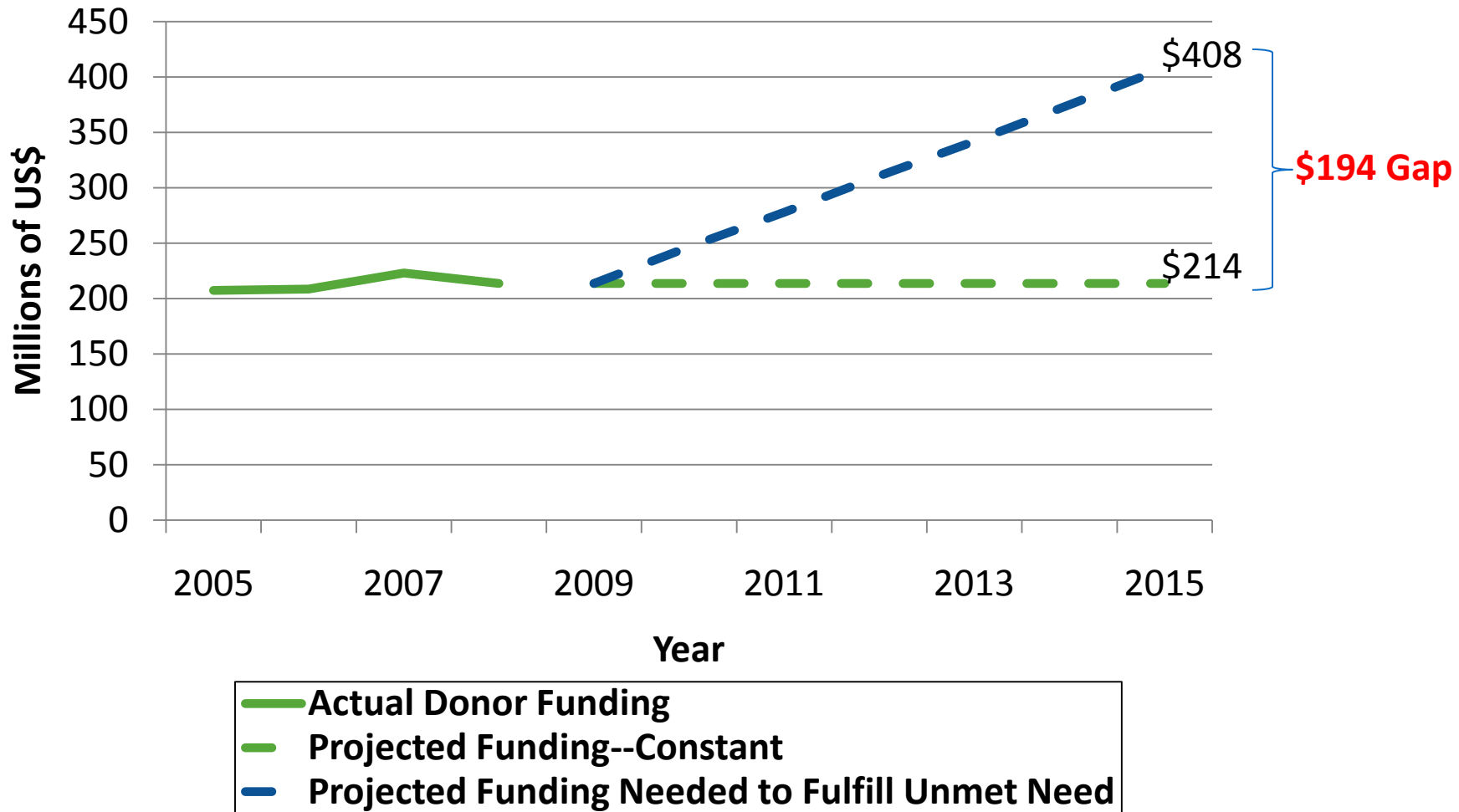

- ✓ Better understanding of reproductive health estimates
- ✓ More confidence in using estimates
- ✓ More consistent use of numbers



Conclusions

Analyzed three popular estimates

Range converges around \$6.7 billion per year for family planning and \$23 billion per year for maternal health

Goal for future: Harmonized global cost estimates, where variations could be pulled out as needed.
